For one man operation, Santa Fe switch engines, and some freight engines are equipped with an electronic device called (it says on the black box in the cab) "Alerter, the dead man control," instead of a dead man pedal.

Made by a big railway supply company, rumor has it that it was thought up by a brilliant young Santa Fe air brake supervisor. Regardless of its origin, in operation it puts the engineer in an electronic harness. His every move is sensed. Unless the engine is standing with the brake set, the engineer must touch, or, if touching, untouch, some part of the controls every fifteen seconds. Otherwise the alerter starts beeping and a red light flashes. Any move previously mentioned will then annul the alarm, as will touching a button provided for that purpose.
